ART SHOW WORTH SEEING

Do you know the life stories of Fanny Holtzmann, Bessie Coleman, or Leah Hing?

Until September 28, the Stevenson Gallery inside the OU-C Quinn Library is exhibiting a terrific new exhibit of paintings by artist Lib Murphy, of Columbus. The show, entitled "The Resurrection Portraits: Icons of Women's History", is a collection of large compositions of women who've made an impact on American life. The artist writes: "Each picture is composed using reference photographs, drawings of objects taken from life, models, written descriptions, and props. Creating a composition takes research and work, but I have fun consulting ship builders, pilots, tailors, librarians, curators, and historians. Each picture is a window through which the viewer is encouraged to time-travel to a place where history is fascinating." School Funding—New Directions in Education Dr. Damon Asbury

The emerging philosophy about funding is called the Backpack philosophy, because children's things go with them; the money goes from district to district. The present government believes in charter schools. The Department of Education approved forty thousand vouchers for 2011-2012 and sixty thousand vouchers for 2012-2013.

Ohio's Voucher Experience

Cleveland Vouchers (The voucher system was first designed for Cleveland in 1995 to provide an alternative program for inner-city children who were in failing schools.) This program/school still exists.

Educational Choice Voucher (Any student in a failing school can qualify for a voucher)

Autism Scholarship available for students with diagnosis (up to \$20,000)

Special education student with an IEP is eligible to receive a voucher to attend another school regardless of the school's academic rating.

HB136- School Choice (Any student can apply for a \$5,700 Voucher)

Keynote Speaker: Dr. Beverly Schmoll, University of Toledo

"Wildly Successful Women"

Dr. Schmoll weaved her professional career story through the following issues. Her story was interesting, thought-provoking and inspiring.

Recent research reveals that despite women's organizations and movements, women are willing to cut each other's throat for: Jobs, Men, Social Approval.

What Gets in the Way of Women Getting to the Top?

- Competition If used in a healthy way, it can be positive (I'm willing to fight for what I want.)
- Envy --most dangerous (I want what you have.)
- Jealousy (You have something I want.)

Women must protect their "five glass balls" that they juggle every day:

Family
Friends
Health
Integrity
Work (a rubber ball)

If one of the glass balls break, it is difficult to pick up the pieces and put it back gether, but if your rubber ball falls it will bounce back.

Gerrymandering: The Elephant in the Room

Redistricting—Maps were reviewed that showed all of the proposed redistricting maps. From perusing the maps, it was obvious that they were drawn to favor one party over another. A lot of counties were not even contiguous. The redistricting map packed districts so heavily with Republicans that only 4 districts would favor Democrats. Cleveland, one of the largest urban areas in Ohio, will not have a representative in congress. It cost \$9,600 to draw the map and it was approved within forty-eight hours of being submitted.

Constitutional Initiative to Reform Redistricting in Ohio:

Executive Summary

A politically independent citizens commission would draw both state legislative and Congressional districts. Under present law, state legislative districts are drawn by a partisan board, and Congressional districts are drawn by the state legislature. This has led to unfair plans being drawn behind closed doors, to the disadvantage of the people of Ohio.

The proposed initiative would take redistricting out of the hands of incumbent politicians, and would place it in the hands of an impartial citizens commission. The Ohio Citizens Independent Redistricting Commission—composed of equal numbers of Republicans, Democrats and Independents, and reflecting the diversity of Ohio—would be required to draw fair districts, which do not favor or disfavor a particular party, Incumbent or candidate. District boundaries would be drawn to promote fairness, competitiveness, compactness, and preservation of existing communities. Paid lobbyist, incumbents, and others with a personal or financial interest in elections would be barred from serving on the citizens commission.

Voters Suppression in Ohio:

Uniformity of extended hours and days for all Ohioans is a concern. Voters' suppression will affect the elderly and minorities the most.
