News from the Be WISE Committee:

Be WISE is a mathematics, science and technology camp designed to develop interest, excitement, and self-confidence in young women who are entering grades 7 or 8 in the fall of 2012.

Be WISE Camp began in the summer of 1989 and since then over 2,800 girls have completed the camp program. This summer will be the camp's 23rd year. Our Branch has participated for 21 of those years and has sent 47 girls! Many additional girls from Ross County have paid their own way each summer, too.

This residential camp for 130 young women will be held from June 10 - 15, 2012. It features a separate curriculum for each grade level emphasizing hands-on activities in math and science. Maximum interaction and instruction is encouraged with a ratio of two teachers per 12-16 girls. And of course, what would camp be without activities such as swimming, volleyball, tennis, and campfires? Be WISE stimulates all facets of the girls.

Be WISE Camp takes place at Denison University in Granville, Ohio. This experience includes sleeping and eating in a college dorm, learning in modern science labs and using campus recreational areas. Our Branch will once again send 2-3 girls by paying \$430 of the \$80 camp fee. Scholarship winners pay just \$50!

The 2012 scholarship applications, and information packets for teachers, are being distributed now. If you know a girl in 6th or 7th grade who has an interest in Science and Mathematics, please encourage her to get an application packet from her Science or Math teachers.

The deadline for submitting applications for our Branch Scholarships is Monday, March 12.

The Violence Against Women Act Needs Your Support Today

Tell the Senate: It's Time to Reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act!

Earlier this month, AAUW and a broad coalition of advocacy groups held a briefing on Capitol Hill for senators and their staff on the critical need to reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). Reauthorization is the process by which Congress prescribes changes to existing laws and extends the authorization for a law to receive appropriations funding. The Senate has heard from professional advocates in Washington -- now they need to hear from you. **Raise your voice and ask your senators to co-sponsor and support the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act (S. 1925).**

AAUW knows that VAWA programs often provide the only or best support for victims of domestic and sexual violence. Now, VAWA reauthorization is ready to go -- the Senate just needs to act. The vital programs supported by VAWA are in desperate need of updating, and we can't allow our leaders to dawdle on such an important issue. Help lead the charge for women and girls nationwide: Ask your senators to reauthorize VAWA. TAKE ACTION!

Program: Experiences of International Students and the 2011 *Be Wise* campers. Nadime Zenteno, an exchange student from Cordoba, Mexico, spoke to us about her experiences here in Chillicothe. She is here through the Exchange Program through Sister Cities. Chillicothe's sister city is Cordoba, Mexico. Since 1992, every year, except one, Chillicothe has had one student from Cordoba. Joyce Atwood is hosting her. She arrived in October 2011 and she will be going back to Mexico in June. She has ten days after school ends to leave the U.S. She came here to improve her English. She attends Chillicothe High School and she will turn 17 years old on Friday, February 3rd. She has a 12 year old brother. School here is different than in Mexico. In Mexico, the 10th grade stays together and the teachers move, here, she is with a different group of students in each class. Her favorite subject is Spanish and her hardest class is biology. She will have two more years left of school when she gets back to Mexico, then she will go to college. She takes ballet and Zumba classes. She wants to learn how to surf, ski and skate. The thing she likes best about Chillicothe is snow.

Bert Magill explained that Be Wise camp is a summer science and math camp held at Denison University. It has been going for 20 years. Girls that our AAUW branch sponsors pay \$50.00 towards their fee and we pay the remaining \$480.00. About 400 girls attend Be Wise each year. It is staffed by certified teachers. This year our branch will have sent 43 girls to Be Wise Camp. Bert would like to approach other women's groups to help sponsor girls to go to Be Wise. Our goal will be to send five girls to camp in one year. Kaylin Hurles, one of our 2011 Be Wise campers, and her mother, Pam Hurles, attended the breakfast. Kaylin spoke to us about her experience. She is a 7th grader at Smith Middle School. She said that the thing she enjoyed the most was making new friends. She stays in touch with several of the girls she met at camp. They did lots of experiments; caught bugs, crawfish and frogs in the stream; and made a pop bottle rocket named HACK. An illusionist came and performed for them. He lay on a bed of nails with another bed of nails on top of him and then a cement block on top of that. Each group of girls was named for a famous woman in science or math. The thing she liked least about camp was dissecting a crawfish because it stank. She would like to go back to camp and when she is in the 8th grade, she plans to apply to be a Counselor in Training (CIT). Costs are covered for CITs. She first heard about the Be Wise program from her teachers.
