"CROSSING THE LINE: SEXUAL HARASSMENT AT SCHOOL"

"Based on findings from a nationally representative survey conducted in May and June, 2011, this report presents the most comprehensive research to date on sexual harassment in grades 7-12 and reveals some sobering statistics about the prevalence of sexual harassment and the negative impact it has on students' education.

The report concludes with concrete recommendations and promising practices for preventing sexual harassment directed at school administrators, educators, parents, students and community members. We hope readers will be inspired to take new steps toward making schools free from sexual harassment.

AAUW Action Fund (general operational funds). Member Bert Magill suggested that we consider donating the funds to the Be WISE program so that our branch could send an additional girl to Be WISE camp. Member Barbara Fabrey supported that idea. Many other members were also in favor of donating the funds to the Be WISE program. The Board will discuss the wishes of the members and make a decision at its next meeting.

March Women's History Awareness Activities:

Recently, a bipartisan group of senators announced the reintroduction of the **Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)**. This is essentially the same bipartisan bill that the Senate passed in April 2012 to improve VAWA programs and ensure all victims get the services they need. Because the House did not pass this version of VAWA before the end of 2012, we must renew our efforts today to protect victims of domestic violence.

Your passionate advocacy got this bill passed last year. [Let's keep the momentum going: Urge your senators to cosponsor and vote for VAWA!](#)

Since its enactment in 1994, VAWA has saved lives and saved money. Though the programs continue to run, the current authorization expired almost two years ago. VAWA reauthorization is long overdue and should be a priority in the 113th Congress.

S. 47 is a well-crafted bill with strong bipartisan support. AAUW is particularly pleased that S. 47 includes campus safety provisions which will ensure that institutions of higher education have comprehensive procedures in place to address domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

Daffodil Diversity Award

Each year at the State Convention, awards are given to Branches who exemplify excellence in membership development and programming that heightens awareness about and appreciation for the value of diversity. We commend Barb Fabrey who has captured all we have done in the recent year to stimulate greater understanding and openness. This year's application for the Daffodil Diversity Award has been drafted and will be published with next month's *Cap & Gown*. A few interesting statistics, to whet your curiosity, is that according to the 2010 Census:

9% of Ross County residents declared themselves non-Caucasian.
Our Branch membership is 5% diverse and growing every year.

With regard to education, just 14% of Ross County citizens have Bachelor or higher degrees (*a surprising number, really*). 100% of our members have college degrees.

30% of businesses in Ross County are owned by women. 13.5% (10) of our members own businesses. (*Do you know who they are and what they do?*)


A new benefit of Branch membership is currently in development. A link to member-owned businesses will soon appear on our website! This will help all of us to support our own entrepreneurs.

Finances: We are in great shape. We have the resources this year to make a few additions to the budget. The Board approved the following at its February 5 meeting:

Make a donation of \$500 to the AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund.

Nationally known Keynote Speakers:


